



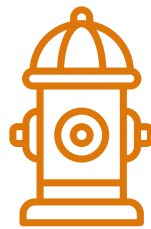
## Annual Report 2024

**147** scholarships were awarded to the children of firefighters.



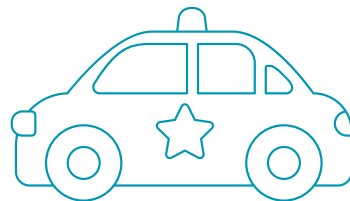
**20** students in financial need were awarded post-secondary scholarships.

Burns Memorial Fund is the legacy of Senator Patrick Burns - a successful rancher, businessman and philanthropist who passed away in 1937. Senator Burns was an active citizen of Calgary, contributing to the development of many of the city’s institutions and charities.

Today, we carry on his work through three Funds:

The Police and Fire Funds support the educational achievements of the children of police officers and firefighters.

The Children’s Fund focuses on the health, education and recreation needs of low-income children and youth.

A Message from the Executive Director

We continued to see high demand for our programs supporting children and youth in 2024 and anticipate this trend will continue. Last year, we assisted a record 63 children in low-income families with their urgent dental care treatment costs and 106 students were provided with a monthly living allowance to help them stay in school and graduate. This direct assistance is made possible through the legacy left by Senator Burns and strengthened through partnerships with donors and funding partners.

In 2024, we were proud to continue to provide support and participate in the Collaborative Funders’ Table, which distributed over \$340,000 to improve outcomes for youth facing barriers to employment. We also continued our commitment to the Natural Supports Leadership Table, recognizing the importance of these supports for young people’s development. These collaborative initiatives give me confidence that together, we can rise to the challenges ahead and continue to support the children, youth and families in our city that are struggling. Through strategic partnerships and our direct assistance programs, our team stands ready to do our part.
