# Bursaries & Scholarships

**75** at-risk students received monthly living allowances so they could stay in school. **9** students in financial need received post-secondary scholarships.



**11** community agencies partnered with us to meet the health, education and recreation needs of **201** children.



**117** post-secondary scholarships and **4** special needs grants were awarded to the children of firefighters.



**16** grants were made to charitable organizations. At least **4,100** children and youth were helped through these programs.



**237** post-secondary scholarships and **12** special needs grants were awarded to the children of police officers.



**37** children were assisted with orthodontic or oral health treatment costs.

### A Message from the Executive Director

It was another year of staggering growth for the Burns Memorial Fund. Participation in our High School Bursary program increased 23%. Grants for emergency dental care rose over 50%.

We know that 2016 will be a difficult year for Calgarians. At the end of 2015, our Board of Trustees affirmed that we will accept every child, youth and family who qualifies for our programs, despite the growing demand on our resources. We stand ready to assist our community as it struggles through a severe downturn.

Our strategic commitment to collaboration helps us to meet increased need. In 2015, we were proud to launch the Collaborative Funders' Table, in partnership with other forward-thinking community funders. Together, we distributed over \$200,000 for out-of-school programs for vulnerable youth. Early evaluation results point to the effectiveness of this granting model.

We thank the many partners named throughout this report for their dedication to our shared work. Together, we build a strong community for our children and youth.

# Partnership Success: The Growth of the Calgary Fetal Alcohol Network

A Life with FASD

At least 9 in every 1,000 babies born in Canada are affected by Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). Although FASD is one of the most preventable developmental disabilities in Canada, it is also a lifelong condition with no cure.

#### **A Partnership Begins**

In 2008, the Calgary Fetal Alcohol Network (CFAN) approached Burns Memorial Fund for help in dealing with sudden, tremendous growth. At the time, CFAN was a grassroots organization tasked by the provincial government with stewarding \$550,000 for community services. CFAN needed a mentor with granting expertise and a commitment to addressing FASD. Over the years, BMF's role with CFAN grew. We sat on the Board, acted as banker and oversaw the granting decisions. We actively supported CFAN's evolution into a provincial society and a registered charity. We helped to distribute more than \$9.3 million to improve the lives of individuals living with FASD.

#### **A Community Leader Emerges**

Today, CFAN is a true community leader, engaging numerous partners in the work to prevent FASD and to ensure that people affected by FASD are able to lead positive, fulfilling lives. Seven years of capacity-building fostered a stable and well-run agency. At the end of 2015, BMF transferred the FASD-related granting programs to CFAN. While we will always support CFAN, it is no longer necessary for us to be an operational partner. We have been privileged to be part of this success story, helping to create a high-impact champion for children, youth and families affected by FASD.

#### Report on the financial statements

Collectively referred to as the "Bequests". We expressed unmodified audit opinions on those financial statements in our reports dated March 18, 2016.

The summarized financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Reading the summarized financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of the Bequests.

#### ${\bf Manage ment's \ responsibility \ for \ the \ summarized \ financial \ statements}$

Management is responsible for the preparation of a summary of the audited financial statements in accordance with criteria established by management that ensures the summarized financial statements agree with the related information in the audited financial statements.

#### Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summarized financial statements based on our audit procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standards (CAS) 810, "Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements".

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the summarized financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of the Bequests for the year ended December 31, 2015 are a fair summary of those financial statements, in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.
