A Message from the Executive Director

Small Size, Large Impact, the title of a report we commissioned in 2016, is an apt description of Burns Memorial Fund.

Our impact flows from our many strategic partnerships. We chair the Collaborative Funders' Table, pooling and distributing funds for out-of-school programs. We recently launched a partnership with Enough for All (E4A), Calgary's poverty reduction strategy, creating a granting program to support the E4A goals. As part of the multi-partner Change Collective, we developed a new practice framework to enhance the natural supports of vulnerable youth.

While such initiatives help us address the systemic issues facing Calgary's children and youth, we continue to provide direct assistance to individuals in need. In 2016, we successfully met growing demand in our High School Bursaries and Families Moving Forward programs and increased our Children's Fund scholarships by over 70%.

Working with numerous community partners, we leverage limited resources for greater impact. Thank you for helping us create a nurturing community for children and youth.

Detour: Youth Turn Towards Success A Partnership Profile

Aging Out of School

Every year, vulnerable youth age out of our K-12 education system, leaving school significantly behind academically, with no career options. These students face complex challenges: poverty, language barriers, lack of strong natural supports, poor mental and physical health.

Testing a New Model

In 2013, Detour was launched as a learning project to test whether the right combination of supports offered in an adult learning environment could help students prepare for meaningful careers. Created as part of All in for Youth, Detour brought together Bow Valley College (BVC), Boys and Girls Clubs of Calgary, Burns Memorial Fund, the Calgary Board of Education, the Calgary Catholic School District and United Way of Calgary and Area.

Over the course of 4 years, 41 students participated in the pilot. The project covered tuition at BVC's Academic Foundations Program, provided monthly living allowances, and connected students to comprehensive supports including career planning, an individualized learning plan, a Success Coach, academic and personal counselling, tutoring and mentoring. The results are hopeful:

Completed the pre-requisites to attend a post-secondary program.

15

Moved on to pursue those programs.

Continue to take courses independently.

Students also reported increased confidence and optimism, improved self-advocacy skills and better relationships with natural supports.

Analysing the Results

Detour came to its planned end in 2017 and a pilot assessment is almost complete. Much has been learned, and will be shared, about the comprehensive mix of supports and services necessary to foster success for these most vulnerable of young people.

Report on the financial statements
